Navy Men to Study 'Top of World'

SEATTLE—(U.P.)—Naval reservists from 13th naval district this summer will have an opportunity to find out what is on the "top of the world" during the Navy's expedition to Point Barrow, Alaska. Point Barrow, far inside the Arctic Circle, is the land where "nights and days are six months long"; where the walrus and the polar bear hold forth; where the Eskimo, missionary and a scattering of whites live throughout the year.

The Point will be a base for the navy's Arctic oil fields and weather stations. During 11 months of the year, it is frozen.

The navy's expedition this year will consist of from three to five Navy cargo vessels, two LST's and an ice-breaker. The party will San Diego June 20 and return Aug. 25.

 Wayne King

As far as 2,500 or so Madison theatergoers are concerned, Wayne is still the King. They virtually filled the Parkway theater twice Monday night for his new concert of popular music.

With a 15-piece orchestra and a 12-voice chorus—which split into smaller ensembles—King presented the kind of music which once made him top man of the airlines and which, since has kept him a highly popular maestro.

There wasn't anything there for the Kenton contingent or for the boogie brigade. Almost the whole show was on the sentimental side, some of it bright and snappy, most of it smooth and easy.

King had changed the format little since his last visit, but there were a few new faces and voices. Nancy Evans of the versatile voice was back. Fred Kendall had become her counterpart on the male side of the group. Jean Richards stepped out of the chous to do a piano solo, "Warsaw Concerto," and Dick Don Broeder, so tall and so blond, came from the group to sing "There Was Moonlight in Her Hair."

The singing and playing were uniformly good, except for one vital factor—poor microphone placement reduced the violins' quality greatly, and this grows the backbone of King's arrangements.

Miss Evans once more displayed the unusual range of her voice, singing torch numbers and the high-flying "Ciribiribin" with equal ease. Kendall showed a masculine tenor of good quality,

but he doesn't need that falsetto to put himself across.

King clowned discreetly through performance, providing it only comedy (except for a honey of a "Pussycat Song" by the Double Daters), and made the customers feel right at home. There was plenty of variety in the choice of tunes—from Strauss to "Cruising Down the River."
