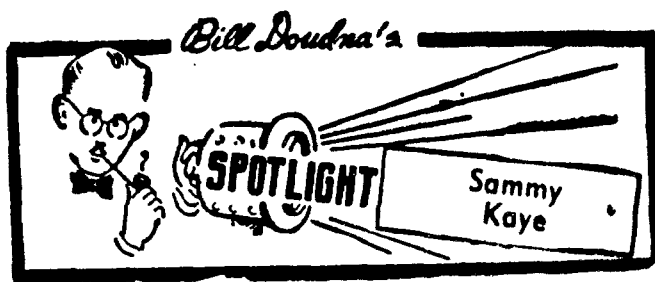

MILTON, Mass. — (U.P.) — Church-going is fun for the children of the First Parish (Congregational) Church of Milton, who have their own miniature house of worship alongside the one used by grown-ups.

The congregation, ranging in age from five to 15, has a special service in the tiny, white, steepled church each Sunday.

A grown-up conducts services, but the youngsters fill the other offices, take up collections and furnish music with a choir and tiny electric organ.
