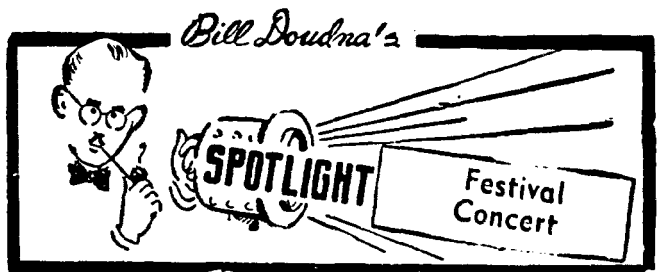

Prof. Richard C. Church of the University of Wisconsin music school will have almost 600 students under his baton when he conducts two movements of Mahler's "Resurrection" symphony tonight.

The University Symphony orchestra, of which he is conductor, the combined University bands, and the massed University choruses, with two soloists, will present the fourth and fifth movements as the climax of the concert which will bring the music school's centennial music festival to an end.

The concert will begin at 8 in the university stock pavilion. It will be open to the public without charge.

The bands, of which Emmett Sarig and Robert Fleury are conductors, will open the program with a Bach choral prelude, "In Dulci Jubilo," then will play Haydn Wood's "Frescoes Suite."

The choruses, which are directed by Bjornar Bergethon, Helene S-Thomas Blotz, and Paul Jones, will sing "In Praise of Music," by Purcell, as transcribed and edited by Max T. Krone, and Earl McDonald's "Songs of Conquest." Jones will conduct the Purcell work and Bergethon will direct the McDonald number.

Soloists in the Mahler symphony will be Jeanne Zischke, soprano, and Ruth Kienholz, contralto.

The committee in charge of the festival, which opened Sunday, consists of Leland A. Coon, chairman; Mrs. Blotz, Church, Leon L. Iltis, and Jones.

GRIEG CHORUS: G. L. Stubkjaer, tenor, and Osvald Berntsen, baritone, will be soloists at the Grieg Male chorus concert at 8 tonight in Central high school auditorium. They also will sing a duet, "Meditation."

RECITAL: Marimba and piano pupils of Dorothy Heick Jorgenson will give a public recital at 8 tonight in the East Side Business Men's clubhouse.

Climax will be the appearance of a marimba ensemble in "The Angelus," Massenet; "The Dance of the Flutes," Tchaikovsky, and "Jeannie with the Light Brown Hair," Foster.

Three of the pupils appearing received first division ratings in last week's state solo-ensemble festival. They are Gwyneth

Chandler, Brooklyn; Carl Schwartz, Middleton; and Bob Kietzman, Westfield.
