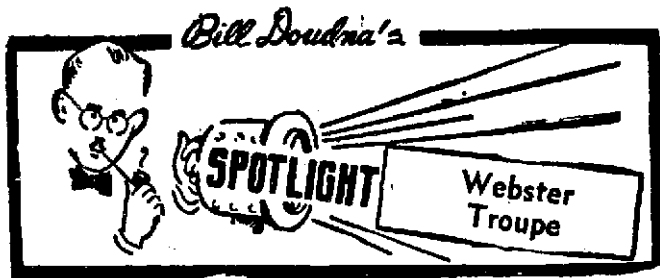

ART: Paintings by two Univer-sity of Wisconsin art education faculty members and a student in applied arts have been accepted for the Minnesota Centennial ex-hibit to be held June 30 to July 23.
 "The Yo Yo Player," an oil by Santos Zingale; "The Trumpet Player," a watercolor by Don An-derson, and "Minnesota Fishing Shack," an oil by John Jones, will be in the show.
 Ninety-six paintings were ac-cepted from entries from South Dakota, North Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, and Wisconsin. Eight pur-chase prizes will be awarded.
 The art education department has announced the dates of the visits of two prominent artists, Victor D'Amico and Ben Shahn.
 They will lecture, visit classes, present shows, conduct seminars, and carry on class criticism.
 Shahn, nationally known paint-er, will spend the week of July 25-29 at the university. D'Amico, director of the Museum of Mod-ern Art and of Fieldston school, New York, will be visiting artist

Aug. 1-15.
