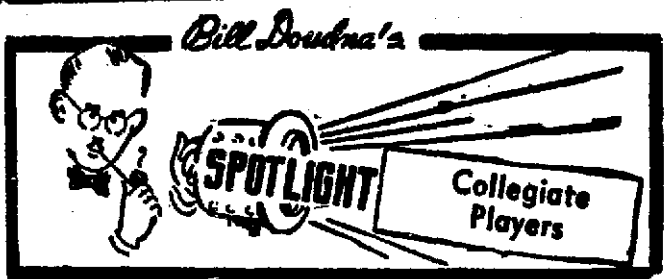

BARBERSHOPPERS:

The Cardinals of Madison, will be among the quartets competing for the 1949 championship in the international finals of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America, Inc., and a chance to appear on a coast-to-coast broadcast over the Mutual network Saturday, June 11, from 10 to 10:30 p. m.

The annual competition will be held at Memorial stadium in Buffalo, New York.

The Mutual broadcast will be an all-champion show featuring winning quartets from past years, leading up to the announcement of the 1949 champions by O. H. "King" Cole, international president of the Society.

BAND BROADCASTS:

George Haberman, Milwaukee, president of the Wisconsin State Federation of Labor, will be intermission speaker on the University of Wisconsin band broadcasts on 64 radio stations in Wisconsin and Upper Michigan this week.

COLLEGE OF THE AIR:

Because of requests received from listeners, three Wisconsin College of the Air programs will be rebroadcast over WHA and WHA-FM beginning Monday.

"Epochs of Comedy," a 16-week course by Prof. Philo M. Buck, Jr., will be broadcast in its entirety over the state FM network at 8 p. m. Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. The Wednesday broadcast will feature the WHA Players in a reading of the comedy discussed on the preceding two programs.

Nine rebroadcasts of "Contemporary Trends," a course dealing with such varied subjects as atomic energy, modern warfare, and world organization, will be heard for three weeks at 11 a. m. Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. The course is directed by Dr. Farrington Daniels, professor of chemistry.

Rebroadcasts of six lectures in "American Government and Politics" will be heard at 11 a. m. Tuesday and Thursday. They are presented by Prof. William S. Stokes, of the University of Wisconsin political science department, and were heard previously

in the evening by FM listeners only.

SUMMER THEATRE: Tryouts will be held Tuesday and Wednesday for the Wisconsin Players' opening production of their 1949 summer playbill. The play, "An Inspector Calls" by J. B. Priestley, will be cast and directed by Frederick A. Buerki. Tryouts are set for 3:30 and 7:30 p. m. both days.

Buerki says that seven characters are needed for the cast. As is customary with the first play of the summer season, persons who wish to tryout need not be enrolled as students. It is necessary that those trying out be in Madison throughout June as the play goes into rehearsal immediately after being cast. It will be staged the first week in July. Tryouts will be held at the Memorial Union.
