## St. Paul Man Pleads Innocent to Cop Killing

MINNEAPOLIS (U.P.)—Gustave Johnson, 26, one of four St. Paul-men accused of killing a Richfield, Minn., policeman, pleaded innocent Friday to charges of first degree murder.

Disa. Judge D. E. LaBelle ordered him held without bond for the September court term.

Johnson and three others—Arthur Bistram, 37, his brother, Carl, 27, and Allen Hartman, 20—were indicted for the slaying of Policeman Fred Babcock, Jr., during an attempted burglary in suburban Richfield last Saturday.

Johnson was captured shortly after the shooting, he other three fled through North Dakota, South Dakota, and Nebraska. Arthur Bistram surrendered in Nebraska but Carl Bistram and Hartman were not taken until they crashed their stolen car in Kansas.

## DISCS OF THE DAY: On the popular side . . .

Frankie Carle: "Let a Smile Be Your Umbrella" and "Sweet Sue." Two oldies that are practically "standards." The voice belongs to Gregg Lawrence.

Perry Como: "Blue Room" and "With a Song of My Heart." Same classification. And Perry sounds easy and relaxed.

Tommy Dorsey: "While the Angelus Was Ringing" and "So in Love." Denny Dennis does the singing, but doesn't do so well with the Cole Porter tune. The orchestra sounds great.

Sammy Kaye: "Powder Your Face" and "Careless Hands." The Kaydets sing, with Don Cornell adding his voice to the second side.

Doris Day and Buddy Clark: "Powder Your Face" and "I'll String Along With You." The second side accounts for a good deal of the tune's new popularity, but the couple misses fire on the former.

Ray Noble: "Lady of Spain" and "I've Got My Love." These are 1935 recordings, and you'll be surprised at how good they sound after 14 years.

Buddy Clark: "I Don't See Me in your Eyes Anymore" and "I Get Up Every Morning." This is an odd setup. Buddy sounds better in the latter, which isn't much of a song, than he does in the former, a rapidly rising hit.

Ray Noble: "Underneath the Linden Tree" and "The Streets of Laredo," with very ordinary singing by Ken Carson; it's the band that sells 'em.

Frank Sinatra: "Comme Ci, Comme Ca" and "While the Angelus Was Ringing." The French tune gets a great boost from Frankie, who sounds weak on "Angelus."

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**SPOTLIGHT** Art Exhibitions

An extensive program of art exhibitions for the summer has been announced by the Memorial Union galleries.

Gimbel's Wisconsin Centennial art collection, which includes paintings by several Madison artists, will return July 28 for its second Madison showing. It will close Aug. 20.

The season will open Wednesday with an exhibition of master works from the collections of the University of Wisconsin and the State Historical society. It will be housed in the Union's main gallery to July 10.

Simultaneously, prints by Ernest Freed will be on view in the theater gallery.

Works of two art education instructors—Richard Arnold and Fred Lauritzen—will be shown in the main gallery from July 10 to July 27, and a collection of Polish graphics will be exhibited in the theater gallery during the same period.

## Two Plead Innocent to Gas Station Jobs

APPLETON (AP) — George Lenz, 25, formerly of Oshkosh, and Julius Kropok, Jr., Racine, pleaded innocent Friday to charges of breaking and entering and grand larceny in connection with a filling station robbery last Saturday night.

Preliminary hearings were set for June 17 by Municipal Judge Oscar Schmiede and the men were returned to the Outagamie county jail when they they could not furnish bonds of \$5,000 each.
