NEW THEATER: James Brandon and Gerald Hiken, veterans of Wisconsin Players, will open their Linden Circle theater at Peel's Linden Inn, near Slinger, on June 30. AT THE FAIR: Programs in the Little theater at the Wisconsin State fair will be divided evenly between drama and music. The Wisconsin Federation of Music Clubs will arrange the first half of the schedule, and the Wisconsin Idea theater and University of Wisconsin college of agricul-

ture will arrange the second.

RURAL WRITERS: The Wisconsin Rural Writers assn. will hold its first annual meeting Sept. 7 to 11 at Green Lake.

TO TEXAS: Junius Eddy, editor of the Wisconsin Idea Theater Quarterly, has been appointed associate professor of drama at Baylor university in Waco, Tex., and will begin his work in September. "Part of his duties," says the current issue of the Quarterly, "will be conducting a two-year study of the leisure-time needs of communities in that area." Eddy is the immediate past president of the Madison Theater Guild.

FILMS AT THE FAIR: The Wisconsin-at-work building at the State Fair, Aug. 20 to 28, will have its own moving picture theater row, the Wisconsin Manufacturers' assn., which sponsors the building has disclosed.

Included will be the Manufacturers' theater with 238 seats and the Utility Industry theater with 185 seats. Both will be air conditioned and open free of charge to persons visiting the Wisconsin-at-work building.

William D. Young, director of the exposition, said that the Utility Industry theater, sponsored by the privately owned electric utilities of the state, will show films depicting operations of power companies.

The Manufacturers' theater will offer educational and promotional films of various companies who are exhibiting. The hourly scheduled shows will also include selected cartoons and short entertainment features.
