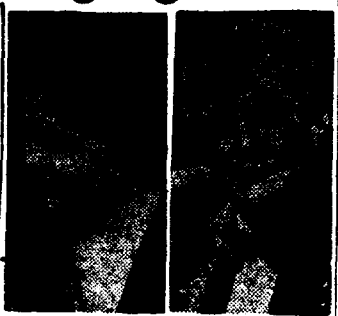

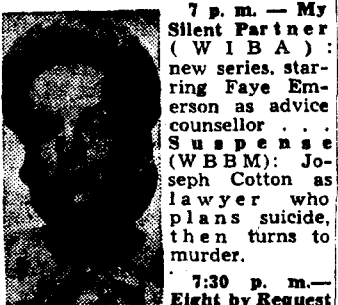

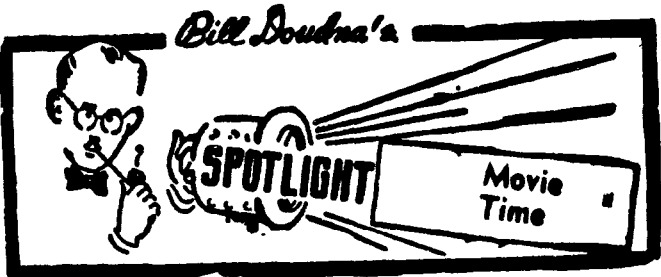

The movie calendar for the summer lists two French films with English subtitles four English films, and one Hollywood movie. "Volpone," a French version of Ben Johnson's comedy, will be shown Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. The next weekend "Nicholas Nickleby," an English film based on Dickens' novel, will take the spotlight.

Scheduled for July 15, 16, and 17 is "The Mikado," movie version of the Gilbert and Sullivan operetta. An English cast spiked with Kenny Baker plays in the technicolor film.

"The Eternal Return" will play July 2, 23, and 24. A modern version of the Tristan and Isolde legend, the French film has English subtitles.

"Tawny Pipit," a sly English satire about a pair of rare birds, will be presented July 29, 30, and 31. "Black Narcissus" is the offering for Aug 5, 6, and 7. The English film stars Deborah Kerr.

The movie version of William Saroyan's "The Time of Your Life" completes the summer film bill on Aug 12, 13, and 14. The film stars James Cagney and William Bendix.

"Movietime" is open to Union members only. Boxoffice hours are 12 noon to 10 p. m. Friday, Saturday, and Sunday.
