

Ebbs is band director and head of school music at Baldwin-Wallace college, from which he holds a degree. He also has a degree from the University of Michigan. Before joining the Baldwin-Wallace faculty, he directed the nationally famous Hobart, Ind., high school band for eight years. Its tours have included successful appearances at the Eastman School of Music and Juilliard school. The All-State band is composed of high school pupils attending the University of Wisconsin's 20th annual music clinic.

Admission will be free.

Guest artist teacher: Madame Olga Conus, pianist and teacher of the staff of the Cincinnati College of Music, will arrive in Madison this weekend to be guest artist teacher at the Wisconsin School of Music for two weeks beginning Monday.

Madame Conus was graduated from the Russian Imperial conservatory in Moscow with the virtuoso diploma. She and her husband, the late Leon Conus, were recommended by Serge Rachmaninof to be the founders and heads of the Russian conservatory in Paris, where they taught before coming to this country.

Madame Conus taught privately in Cincinnati during her husband's tenure with the Cincinnati College of Music and after his death was asked to assume his place on the faculty.

Peter Paul Loyalich, who appeared successfully as soloist with

the Madison Civic Symphony Orchestra last February, is a pupil of Madame Conus. Jean Geis, current winner of the National Federation of Music Clubs contest and engaged to appear as soloist with the Madison orchestra next season, was a former pupil of Madame Conus.

"Mike Reagan," a new private detective character, will be heard in the person of screen star William Gargan over WBS starting Sunday, Aug. 7.

The veteran daytime radio serial, "Vic and Sade," off the air since 1946 will start a new series over NBC-TV this month.

Kay Kyser's ABC daytime program over ABC will be cancelled after the July 25 broadcast. Glenn Drake will switch to the Kyser time segment on Sept. 18.

Frank Sinatra's new NBC series is scheduled to start on Sept. 5 from Hollywood. Dorothy Kirsten will probably be heard with Sinatra on the show, which will be a five-night-a-week feature.

The format of "Take It Or Leave It" may be changed slightly now that Eddie Cantor will be the emcee of the NBC program.
