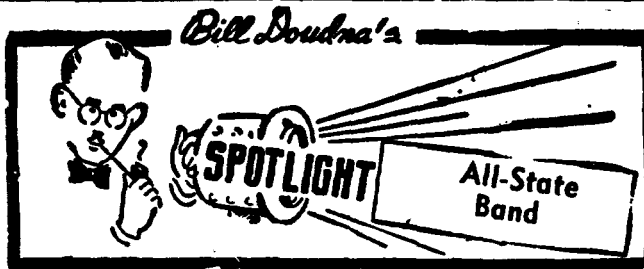

In preparation for its major concert next weekend, the All-State High School band gave an informal and varied concert Sunday afternoon on the Memorial Union terrace.

It was a sort of dress rehearsal for the program which the 200-piece organization will present at 3 p.m. Sunday in the University of Wisconsin stadium. Nevertheless, it was a fine example of what these young musicians can accomplish under the intensive training of the annual university music clinic.

Terrace Jammed

This concert was free, spon-

sored by the Wisconsin Union music committee, and it attracted about as many people as could crowd themselves on the terrace and the adjoining steps of the Wisconsin Union theater. Tickets for the July 24 concert will go on sale Monday at the theater box-office, and will be available also at the stadium gates.

Frederick C. Ebbs of the Baldwin-Wallace college music faculty conducted the band, except for the last number—"On, Wisconsin"—for which Emmett Sarig, acting conductor of university bands took the baton. The number was in tribute to Prof. Raymond F. Dvorak, university band director who has returned to a hospital for another in a series of operations which resulted from a train accident.

director of the clinic, spoke at

The youngsters, who come from
all over Wisconsin, from other
states, and even from Canada,
paid the strictest of attention to
Ebbs' conducting without being
mechanical about it. And ap-
parently they had paid equally
strict attention to the other in-
structors who supervise the vari-
ous sections of the band during
the clinic.

For less than two weeks' re-
hearsal, it was remarkable, even
when you consider that these
youngsters are the pick of the
state's high schools' musical crop.

Takes Ability

Desire isn't enough to get some-
one into the classes of this clinic;
ability, as certified by school
officials, must be there, too.

This was best shown, perhaps,
in the playing of the familiar an-
dante from Tchaikowsky's sixth
symphony, and almost as well in
the march from the same work.
Lovely tone and excellent rhyth-
mic sense marked them both.

A BIG STRETCH

AKRON, O. — (U.P.) — Approx-
