Wisconsin Players

Marjorie Schaffer, graduate student from Milwaukee, will play the title role in Wisconsin Players' production of "Antigone" at the Wisconsin Union theater this week. The Jean Anouilh version of the Greek legend will be presented at 8 p. m. Thursday, Friday, and Saturday.

Miss Schaffer has appeared with the University of Wisconsin group in "River Boat" and "Merchant of Yonkers."

Other leading roles in "Antigone" will be played by Kenneth Abrahamson, as the tyrant Creon, and John MacEachron, as the chorus. The former is a teacher of speech and drama at Ashland high school. MacEachron comes from Des Moines, Ia., and has been active in dramatic work at Grinnell college.

Other roles will be played by Robert B. Kaltz, Paterson, N. J.; Doris Staidl, Peshtigo; Marvin Carter, Atlanta, Ga.; Richard Leeman, Milwaukee; Charles Scott, Indianapolis, Ind.; Norman J. Kaiser, graduate student from Iowa; William W. West, high school teacher from Racine, and Mary Fluhrer, Davenport, Ia., whose training has included work at the American Academy of Dramatic Art in New York City.

In brief this is the story: The two sons of Oedipus, late king of Thebes, started a civil war and were killed. Their uncle Creon became regent. Creon, resembling in thought and action a latter day totalitarian, ordered that one of the brothers who had, in his opinion, provoked the civil war be left unburied. Antigone, an individual clinging to a higher law, covered the body of her brother with earth. Creon had her buried alive for punishment. This brings about his eventual ruin.
