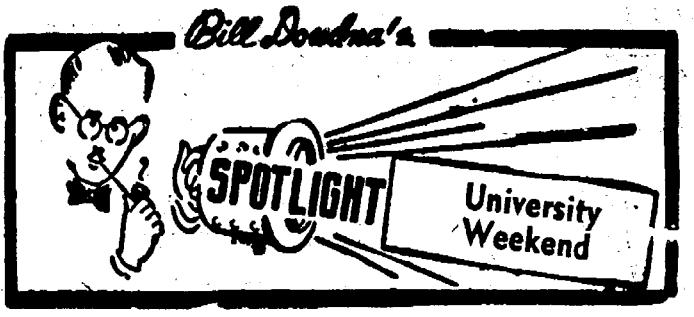

It's a busy weekend at the University of Wisconsin, with music, drama, and movies on the schedule.

Things start at 7 tonight with a free, public outdoor concert by the Summer Session band under the direction of Ernest Justice, band director at Northeastern State college, Tahlequah, Okla. The organization will play on the Memorial Union terrace.

Three guest conductors will appear—Harold Green, high school music director at Dundee, Ill.; William H. Hamlin, director of music at Alcorn college, Alcorn, Miss., and Allan Bone, band director at Duke university, Durham, N. C.

David Laurent, baritone, will be guest soloist, singing "Come, Sweet Death," by Bach.

The band will play "Wisconsin Songs," "Music in the Park," Bergem; "Enchanted Prince" overture, Johnson; "Military March No. 3," Schubert; "American Folk Rhapsody," Grundman; "Stradella," Flotow; "And Original Suite," Jacob; "Field Day March," Khachatourian; "Chocolate Soldier," selections, Straus; "On Wisconsin," Purdy; "Varsity."

Two movies covering the period from D-Day to VE Day in the Battle of Europe and the surrender of Japan will be shown at 7:30 tonight in 116 Education-Engineering bldg. The screening will be open only to students. The films are "The True Glory" and "Japan Surrenders." They will be shown as part of Prof. C. V. Easum's course in "Origins and History of World War II."

Maud Scheerer, reader, will be presented by Wisconsin Players in Maxwell Anderson's "Anne of the Thousand Days" at 8 tonight and at 8 p. m. Friday and Saturday in the Wisconsin Union theater.

Two plays will be given in Spanish at 8 tonight in Bascom theater by the University Spanish club and the department of Spanish and Portuguese. Admission will be free and the public is invited.

The first of two trio concerts will be presented by the university music school at 8 p. m. Friday in Music hall. The artists will be Emil Heermann, concertmaster of the Cincinnati Symphony orchestra, violin; Walter Heermann, conductor of the Madison Civic Symphony orchestra, cello, and Leo Steffens, of the university music faculty, piano.

The program, open to the public without charge, will consist of "Trio in G Major," Mozart; "Quasi Variazione," from Opus 9 Rachmaninoff; "Trio in B Flat Major, Opus 97 (The Archduke)," Beethoven.
