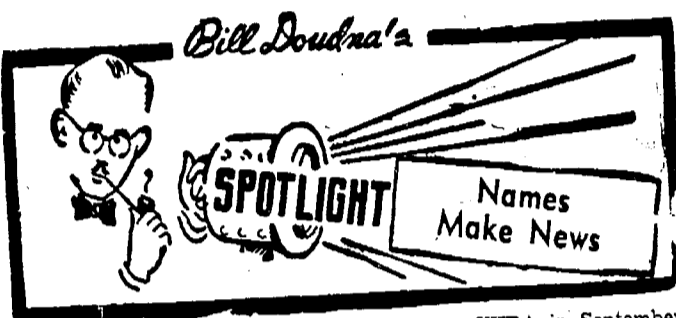

FM RECEPTION: A letter from Jack Grigsby, Darlington: Dear Mr. Doudna:

On reading your "FM Lengthens its Horizons" in the July 31 State Journal, I thought you would be interested in the list of FM stations I have been able to get on my \$39 FM set, using an inside antenna. It has taken a lot of exploring, but I must admit it is hardly worth while, for out of the 57 stations listed, there are only 16 that one could listen to and get a continuous program. I notice on your list you have WHSS, Wausau, which I have not. I have WSAU, Wausau; also, I seem to have missed WFHR, Wisconsin Rapids.

Once in a great while it is strange that the longest distance station WELD, Columbus, O., can be heard quite distinctly after 9 p. m. The distance is about 400 miles, whereas Milwaukee

(WTMJ) is at times quite inaudible.

Very high humidity, I believe, affects FM to a great extent. I have noticed that on the few days this summer the humidity has been low, the reception has been twice as good. My home is in about the highest part of this town, which I imagine is quite a help, for as far as I know, there are very few who are able to get more than a dozen stations of any kind. FM is quite a help in a bad storm, but when I really want to hear something, I'll still take AM.

AUTHOR: When Ralph Peterson reviews "The University of Wisconsin: A History" on his radio book program over WFOV Sunday at 5:15 p. m., he will conclude his comments with an extemporaneous discussion about both the book and his review with its co-authors, Prof. Merle Curti and Vernon Carstensen.
