Six Old Civil War Vets Open Final GAR Encampment

INDIANAPOLIS — (U.P.) — Six old Civil War veterans, who traveled 6,000 miles to say goodbye to each other for the last time, opened the final encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) Sunday.

They were the only ones of 16 surviving Union army veterans able to come for the 83rd encampment.

Frail and tottery at ages ranging from 100 to 108, they met in a last farewell to chat about the battles they fought 85 year ago.

They sat through a long memorial program in a big dance hall to hear tributes to their dead comrades, including one by Carl R. Gray, U. S. veterans administrator.

"It is my definite conviction that the people shall carry on, as long as any remain, the care of those who fought for the land our forefathers created," Gray said.

National Commander Theodore A. Penland, 100, Portland, Ore., sat erectly on the speaker's platform with Gray. The others sat in wheelchairs on the outskirts of the audience.

For four days the old soldiers will swap their yarns.

Then they are scheduled to disband a once-powerful organization which at its peak numbered 409,000 and played an influential part in electing six presidents of the United States.
