'Family Closeup' Series to Start Sunday on WISC

Family Service, a Red Feather service of the Madison Community Chest, will join Family Service agencies throughout the country in presenting a documentary radio series, "Family Closeup," starting Sunday at 4 p. m. over WISC.

Mrs. Sophia Siebecker, director of the Madison Family Service agency, said that the 13-week series will present the problems of America families as they are, without judgment or preachment, with emphasis on the root cause of conflict.

"We hope this series will help many people in Madison to understand that their family problems are not singular but are shared by many others; that the help of skilled family counsellors is provided by the citizens of this community; and that the seeking of such help is in itself an assertion of strength rather than weakness," Mrs. Siebecker said. "As with many crippling illnesses, the tensions and strains in family relationships can be prevented from having their worst effect if people understand the importance of taking preventive action in time."

The initial broadcast will tell the story of a young husband faced with the possibility of losing his job. Other programs in the series will tell the stories of families with marital problems, strained relations between elderly people and the younger family, an aggressive child in conflict with parental authority, families in debt, families vainly searching for happiness.
