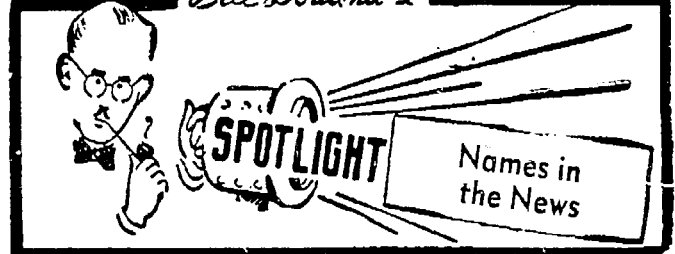

Harry Hall, baritone who will be with Wayne King's orchestra at the Parkway theater Tuesday, Sept. 27, is a native of Milwaukee who started singing publicly at the age of 12. A Milwaukee news-

paper says he attended the University of Wisconsin, but the alumni records office has nothing on him, which indicates that he probably attended Milwaukee Extension . . . King heard him at the College Inn in Chicago, where he went from radio. Winning a "Talent Scouts" contest put Hall on the air soon after his discharge from the navy.

Mary Lou Anderson, Delavan, is one of the semi-finalists in the "Radio Theater" contest to select the most beautiful 15-year-old girl in America.

Leon Rothier, French basso, will mark the golden anniversary of his singing career with a recital Oct. 1 in New York's Town Hall. One of the few surviving stars of the Metropolitan's "golden age," he was a Met star for 30 years, singing 1,687 performances (probably a record).

Maggie Teyte plans a country-wide tour of her concert version of "Faust," which had its first performance at Stockbridge, Mass. She has also arranged concert versions of Gounod's "Romeo and Juliet" and Massenet's "Werther." She will be narrator in the Gounod programs and will sing Charlotte in "Werther."

Rise Stevens, who will open the Wisconsin Union concert series Oct. 15 and 16, has been offered a 10-year contract with the Vienna State Opera, calling for two months of appearances each year beginning next season.

Leopold Stokowski will be the first conductor of the New York Philharmonic - Symphony season, which will open Oct. 13. Stokowski will be in charge for eight weeks, then will return in the spring for a fortnight.

Radio Daily says that the duke and duchess of Windsor have been approached about a "Mr. and Mrs." radio show for the U. S. It would be transcribed in Italy.

Vera Vague will be in the cast of the Jimmy Durante show, which returns Oct. 7.

Helen Hayes and the Theater Guild have decided that "Good Housekeeping," her summer show, will be strong enough for Broadway after some rewriting by the author, William McCleary. It will begin a pre-New York tour on Oct. 20 at Wilmington, Dela.
