12:00—KNX—Under the joint musical direction of Leopold Stokowski and Dimitri Mitropolous the New York Philharmonic opens its winter season. Stokowski leads off with the "Symphony in C Minor, No. 1" of Brahms and Chopin's "Mazurka No. 13 in A Minor."

2:00—KFI—Persons who will be left behind after the International Refugee Organization of the United Nations winds up its work of repatriation will tell their own story on the sixth of this documentary series.

2:30—KECA—"What Shall It Profit a Man" . . . the story of a man who wins out in a struggle between decency and ambition, will be dramatized on "The Greatest Story Ever Told."
