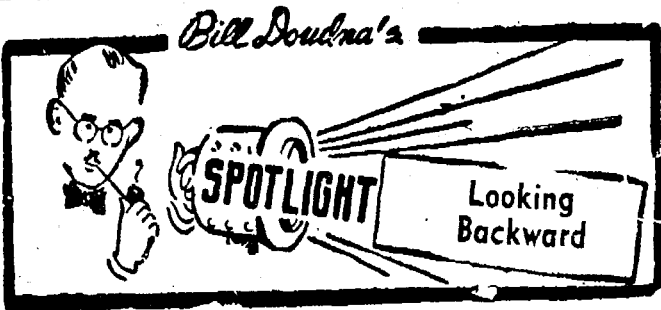

Then, the leading role was played by Don Ameche, who already had changed his name from Dominic Felix Amici. And in a minor part was one Yewell Tompkins, now know to Broadway as Tom Ewell, whose greatest fame came with his work in "John Loves Mary."

Another top role was played by Don Varian, currently director of speech and theater at the University of Akron, O. The director was Prof. William C. Troutman, who developed many of the campus' outstanding actors, and the press agent was George Schlotthauer, now a Madison attorney.

"Two fine actors" graced the play. The State Journal review said. They were Ameche and Varian. And another was "excellent in his brief appearance." That was Tompkins, who (i n c i d e n t a l l y) played the part of Lawyer Tompkins.

Of Ameche, The State Journal said on his first campus debut:

"Ameche is a new luminary on the campus, but he justified Troutman's decision in giving him the role of Dick Dudgeon . . . a fine characterization."

Writing in the Daily Cardinal, Bob Godley made this observation:

"With one performance, he placed himself in a class with Herman Wirka . . ." who is now associate professor of orthopedic surgery in the university school of medicine.
