WHEN JANET WALDO STEPS BEFORE THE MICROPHONE every Friday night as the star of CBS' popular comedy show of college life, "Young Love," she's doing what comes most naturally. First of all, Janet has been playing the charming teen-ager of the "Meet Corliss Archer" show for several years and has just stepped into a maturer age bracket. Second, the entire "Young Love" show was developed with Janet and her co-star, Jimmy Lydon, in mind, and virtually every situation in the story is taken from the real-life experiences of Janet and her husband, Robert E. Lee, the show's writer-director-producer. **KTSA—9 p.m.**

GERTRUDE BERG'S SERIAL, "THE GOLDBERGS," which has enjoyed a phenomenally long run on the radio, is currently being presented on CBS every Friday night. Originally known as "The Rise of the Goldbergs," the series went on the air Nov. 20, 1929, and became an immediate success. This perennially popular saga of family life was uniquely molded from a pattern of comedy that bordered on tears and tears that bordered on comedy. **KTSA—7 p.m.**

"WE, THE PEOPLE," THE PROGRAM WHICH EACH week brings headline personalities before the microphone and television camera, has moved to the NBC network. The program will retain its original format of interviews with people-in-the-news. Dan Seymour presides as host and master of ceremonies of the simulcasts. After almost 12 years, "We, the People," in switching to NBC, returns to the network on which it originated for a six-months run which started in October, 1936. **WOAI—7:30 p.m.**
