

Murrow Voices Second Album of History Records

Columbia Records, Inc., has completed production and soon will release "I Can Hear It Now," Volume II, with C.B.S. Reporter Edward R. Murrow as narrator, it was announced Monday by Goddard Lieberson, executive vice-president of Columbia Records. The release covers the 1945-1949 period in world history.

The second volume of "I Can Hear It Now" is described by Murrow as "the story of the desperate and sometimes agonizing search for peace, of the first three years of the atomic age, of the phenomenon of the unsought world leadership suddenly thrust upon the average American, and of the bizarre side-shows which kept slightly bewildered citizens from losing the resilience which is the very core of their strength."

It was prepared by Murrow in collaboration with Fred W. Friendly, prominent radio and television producer-writer. It was produced for Columbia by J. G. Gude.

Volume II opens with V-J Day celebrations from New York, San Francisco, Washington, London and Moscow and continues through the 1948 presidential campaign, and into 1949. It contains the voices of Franklin D. Roosevelt, Harry S. Truman, Winston Churchill, Fiorello H. La Guardia, Thomas E. Dewey, Bernard Baruch, Clement R. Attlee, George Marshall, Walter Winchell, H. V. Kaltenborn, Dwight D. Eisenhower, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jawahar Lal Nehru, Howard W. Hughes, James C. Petrillo, Marshal Tito, Andrei Y. Vishinsky and many others.
