RAY MILLAND WILL BE STARRED IN "The Enchanted Cottage" as this Sunday's offering of The Theatre Guild on the Air. Written by Arthur Wing Pinero, "The Enchanted Cottage" was first produced in London in 1922. A year later it was presented on the New York stage. It is the moving story of a relationship between a wounded, disfigured war veteran and a homely girl. ## BERGEN RUNS TWO-BITS INTO FORTUNE

A 25 cent investment he made as a schoolboy has returned a fortune to Edgar Bergen.

When he was a mere lad in grammar school, Bergen spent a quarter for a copy of "Hermann's Wizard's Manual," whose contents included full directions for cutting a man's head off and putting it on a platter a yard from his body . . . and for mastery of the art of ventriloquy.

That two bits is the only money Bergen ever has spent to learn the technique that has made him one of the world's highest paid entertainers, and so eminent an authority on ventriloquism that he wrote the Encyclopedia Britannica's article on the subject.
