Intolerance, bigotry and race discrimination which flourish in several such organizations have been condemned by such institutions as the National Education Association, the National Pan-Hellenic Association, the Young Women's Christian Association and Parent-Teacher groups. A majority of the state boards of education, legislatures of 28 states, high school principals and other educators have gone on record as opposing high school sororities. Cooperating in educators' efforts to combat this condition, Byron and Shaw have dramatized a tragic case growing out of such a situation.
