

Odets imitates the writing of Julian Green, the young promis-ing French author whose stories are all alike. He brings out all the mean characteristics of narrow. frustrated families who apparently have no kindness or love in their makeup. I found no moral nor lesson in the story. The best that I can say about it is that there were two ten minute intermissions plus a short scene change wait, and that is was over at 10 o'clock.
