Rita Insists Baby Not Due Till February

Lausanne, Switzerland — Rita

Hayworth looked this reporter right in the eye Tuesday and said: "I don't expect to have a baby until February and why everybody seems to think it's going to happen earlier beats me."

Rita, who married the fabulously wealthy Prince Aly Khan last May 27, deserved an Oscar for her performance.

Police already have taken up posts around the exclusive Mont-Choisi Maternity clinic, at Aly's request, to keep crowds away when Princess Rita enters.

A detective is stationed inside the clinic to see that no member of the staff talks to reporters.

Only last week an official source, in direct contact with Rita's doctor, Prof. Rodolphe Rochat, said flatly the gynecologist regarded the birth as "imminent."

Rita, one of the best-paid actresses in Hollywood, has insisted all along that her baby will be born in February, even after her father-in-law, the Aga Khan, guessed in an unguarded moment the birth will be premature.

The beautiful Rita sat in her cream-colored Cadillac convertible outside the Chateau Dorigny while her husband poured buckets of champagne for reporters.

While toasts to the future son or daughter filled the air, Rita wrapped herself more snugly in her long, dark mink coat and kidded the United Press man over his
