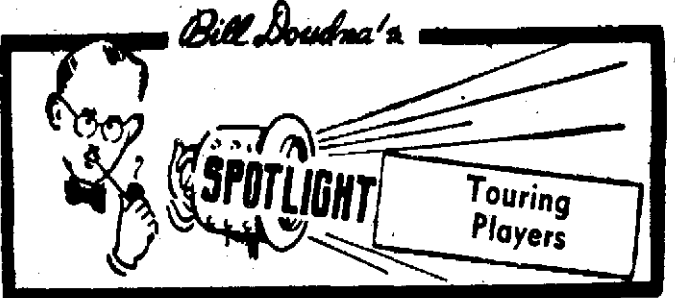

TIP O' THE MORNING: It hasn't been announced publicly, but NBC will kill off "Hollywood Calling" after the Jan. 8 broadcast . . . Oddly enough, Mutual will revive an old quiz show today and Columbia will revive two of them Sunday.

Sixteen alumni of the Catholic university of Washington, D. C. — noted for its fine theatricals — will arrive in Madison today to present Shakespeare's "Much Ado About Nothing" in West high school auditorium. The curtain will go up at 8 p. m.

Madison chapter of Blackfriars Guild will sponsor the appearance.

Milwaukee critics were unanimous in their praise of the production when it opened a short run there earlier this week. They found the University Players uniformly good, playing the comedy with bounce and vigor.

Only one member of the group won't be seen by the audience. He is Jim Brennan, technical director and stage manager, who managed the Chicago Railroad fair's pageant the last two summers.

After handling 42 stage hands and 50 horses, he says he finds that 15 actors who double as stage hands and baggagemen aren't too rough on him.

Before starting the 7,000-mile tour in two cars and a truck, the University Players catalogued the facilities of each stage they were to use, and arranged settings that would fit all of them. The truck was rigged with the efficiency that some of the troupe learned while handling military transport in World War II.
