

RADIO PROGRAMS AND PERSONALITIES

SZYMON GOLDBERG, DISTINGUISHED POLISH VIOLINIST, MAKES HIS FIRST NATIONAL broadcast in this country when he plays with the New York Philharmonic-Symphony, under the baton of Dimitri Mitropoulos, on CBS Sunday, Jan. 15. Goldberg will be heard in the Beethoven Concerto for Violin and Orchestra in D Major, Opus 61, for which he uses a version somewhat different from the one usually played. From a photostat of the Beethoven manuscript, now in Vienna, the violinist found about 80 bars which the composer had written in variance with the traditional version. Mitropoulos will lead the orchestra in the American radio premiere of Roger Sessions' Symphony No. 2, dedicated to the memory of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt, whose death occurred while Mr. Sessions was working on the slow movement. It was first performed in January 1947 by the San Francisco Symphony under Monteux. Chosen in 1949 for the newly established Naumberg Composer's Award, the symphony will be recorded under the auspices of the Walter W. Naumberg Foundation. KTSa—2:30 P.M. (FM); 10:30-12 P.M. (AM)
