Atom Bomb Film Scheduled Sunday

"God of the Atom," natural-color scientific film, will be shown at 7:30 p.m. Sunday in the Alamo Heights Methodist Church by Percy A. Bagge, film representative for the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.

Approved by the American Scientific Affiliation and commended by the Atomic Energy Commission, "God of the Atom" includes actual photographs of the Nagasaki and Bikini explosions as well as scientific apparatus used in atomic research.

Open to the public, the film is being shown free of charge.

Young Musicians To Enter Competition

Three young musicians from San Antonio—Suzanne Westbrook, Priscilla Anne Crea and Balbina Louise Ahr, and one from New Braunfels, Kenneth A. Triesch—are among the 40 applicants approved to participate in the 1950 Young Artist Competition sponsored by the Civic Federation of Dallas.
