Russia Reported Asking Sub Bases in China, Korea

TOKYO —(UP)— Russia is negotiating for submarine bases in China and in Communist-dominated northern Korea, reports to reports and Japanese American sources said Sunday

Russia already is basing submarines in southern Sakhalin island, taken from Japan after the was, as well as at Dairen, Manchuria, and Vladivostock on the Soviet far eastern coast the reports said.

The submarine parts are sent to far eastern ports via the trans-Siberian railroad, the reports say, and then assembled at Vladivostok.
