Members of the Madison Civic symphony orchestra report privately that tonight's concert will be something for the books. Some of those who were in Sunday's rehearsal with Pianist Jean Geiss told this department that her performance of Rachmaninoff's second piano concerto promises to be powerful and compelling.

The concert will be at 8:15 in the Masonic auditorium. Admission will be free. Doors will be open an hour before concert time, but will be closed during the first number—Mottl's arrangement of ballet music from Gretry's "Cephale and Procris. Schumann's fourth symphony, played without pauses between movements, will complete the first half. After intermission, the orchestra will play the introduction and "Persian Dance" from "Khovantchina," and the concert will close with the concerto.

Walter Heermann will conduct.
