John Kelley to Address State Manufacturers

John M. Kelley, Jr., Washington, D. C., special assistant U. S. attorney general who is a former Ft. Atkinson attorney and a University of Wisconsin graduate, will be the dinner speaker at the 39th annual meeting of the Wisconsin Manufacturers' assn. in the Pfister hotel, Milwaukee, Tuesday, May 16.

Kelley will speak on "The Detection and Trial of Cold War Traitors," using as background his experience in the preparation and trial of Axis Sally, Judith Coplon, and Valentin Gubitchev.

Born in Barbao, Kelley was a lawyer in Ft. Atkinson for 10 years before joining the justice department in 1942.
