Sigmund Romberg bounced through the Parkway theater Thursday night to a large audience for the second half—made up of his own compositions.

About 1,000 persons greeted the 62-year-old composer-conductor's first-rate orchestra at the first of two concerts; the second house was somewhat smaller.

They dutifully applauded the overworked "Beautiful Galatea" overture and some arias, went strong for a sparkling arrangement of "South Pacific" tunes, and liked other music in the first section.

With Romberg at the piano and the competent Frank Cork conducting, the second period brought music from "Blossom Time," "The Student Prince," "Up in Central Park," and other Romberg hits.

Kirsten Kenyon led the soloists in quality, singing warmly; Gail Manners uncorked some topnotch humor in "The Fireman's Bride," and Christina Carroll placed third.

Gene Markey, tenor, somehow managed to make "The Lord's Prayer" sound like a love song and "Stouthearted Men" like a ballad.
