Air Group Director May Be Named June 9

GREEN BAY — (AP) — A new director of aeronautics for Wisconsin probably will be named when the state aeronautics commission meets in Madison June 9, according to Commission Chairman Howard Morey.

Morey said the commission had sifted through more than 100 applications for the post and now was down to the cream of the crop. Morey was here for an Association of Commerce meeting.

Wisconsin has been without an aeronautics director since Col. Lester J. Maitland resigned in February, 1949, to take a similar post in Michigan.

Col. Maitland was Wisconsin's first aeronautics director. The position was created by the 1945 legislature.
