Dulles Says U.S. Loses Cold War

Claims Reds Winning for Last 4-5 Years

WASHINGTON — (J.P.) — John Foster Dulles, special state department consultant, asserted Sunday the United States is losing the cold war to Russia and has been for the last four or five years.

"We have made some gains in some areas," he said, but "in the net balance I think Russian Communism has been winning."

The Republican foreign policy spokesman, recently named assistant to Secretary of State Dean Acheson, also said the breach in the bi-partisan foreign policy was due to the Democrats' belief—after the 1948 elections—that they could "get along without much Republican help."

Dulles made the statements in a radio interview. He also said:

ONE. The United States does not "necessarily" face war since the Russians can get everything they want with the cold war.
