## Fares Increased PSC OKs Boosts,

## The state Public Service Commission (PSC) issued an order Friday afternoon increasing fares and adding additional routes to the Maple Bluff-Mendota Bus Lines, Inc., was authorized to file on one day's notice a revised tariff providing fares of 10 cents between Madison and Sherman Park and Lakewood, and 15 cents between Madison and Maple Bluff. The line did not ask increase of the 5-cent fare between Madison and Sherman park, but the PSC's order increased it to 10 cents, stating that keeping the fare at 5 cents "appears to be preferential when compared with the proposed fares to Lakewood to the extent that the fare for the greater distance to Sherman park would be less than that for the shorter distance to Lakewood."
