Mendota Bus Fares Increased

PSC OKs Boosts, Adds More Routes

The state Public Service Commission (PSC) issued an order Friday afternoon increasing fares and adding additional routes to the Maple Bluff-Mendota bus line.

Maple Bluff-Mendota Bus Lines, Inc., was authorized to file on one day's notice a revised tariff providing fares of 10 cents between Madison and Sherman Park and Lakewood, and 15 cents between Madison and Maple Bluff.

Additions to Routes

The commission also approved adding the following routes to the line: Hanover st. to Lakeview ave.; Lakeview ave. to, into, and through Lake View sanatorium grounds; and from the grounds to join with the present route.

In its investigation of the line's application to increase fares and add routes, the commission found that old fares of 5 cents to Sherman Park and Lakewood and 10 cents to Maple Bluff were "not reasonable and lawful because they do not produce sufficient revenue to enable the applicant to render proper service to the public."

One Hike Not Asked

The line did not ask increase of the 5-cent fare between Madison and Sherman park, but the PSC's order increased it to 10 cents, stating that keeping the fare at 5 cents "appears to be preferential when compared with the proposed fares to Lakewood to the extent that the fare for the greater distance to Sherman park would be less than that for the shorter distance to Lakewood."

Earlier requests by the company to abandon service on certain routes were withdrawn before Friday's order was issued.

Hospitalized Vet Asks Help in Locating Buddy
