Among those seeking asylum were 270 young German blue shirt deserters from the Red rally honoring Josef Stalin and 38 members of te Soviet sector "People's Police" force.

classified the police deserters as "political refugees" with the right to live and work in West Berlin or to be absorbed in Western Ger-

many.

The 270 adventurous youngsters refused under prodding to return to the Soviet zone and a special commission was set up to sort out those who may qualify to
