New Refugee Wave Streams into West Zone

BERLIN—(AP)—Hundreds of refugees from the Soviet East zone poured in on West Berlin's welfare agency Friday with stories of escaping during the confusions of the Whitsun tide Communist youth march of 500,000.

An American official said West Berlin and Western Germany are "just about busting at the seams with refugees" but predicted the Germans would try to accommodate most of them.

Includes Thousands

German officials estimated several thousand persons were in the new refugee wave. They were unable to give exact figures.

Among those seeking asylum were 270 young German blue shirt deserters from the Red rally honoring Josef Stalin and 38 members of the Soviet sector "People's Police" force.

The central welfare board classified the police deserters as "political refugees" with the right to live and work in West Berlin or to be absorbed in Western Germany.

The 270 adventurous youngsters refused under prodding to return to the Soviet zone and a special commission was set up to sort out those who may qualify to stay.

Jam Relief Offices

A thousand men and women from the East descended on relief offices when they reopened Thursday after the long holiday shutdown. Hundreds more came Friday.

All said they took advantage of police preoccupation with the rally to slip away and hide along the sector borders or with friends and relatives until they could emerge with petitions for sanctuary.

Among the 38 police deserters were some men identified as actually members of the heavily armed East German military establishment that the Western powers recently called an illegal army in police disguise. Then thousand of such bronzed infantrymen were a feature of the Whitsun tide march.
