Extension Asked on Burrows Park Drive Ban Deadline

A delegation of Maple Bluff property owners adjoining the city-owned Burrows park applied to City Manager Howell Friday afternoon for a 60-day time-extension on the city's order to stop using Burrows park drives for access to their homes.

The order was issued three months ago, to take effect July 1. Compliance would necessitate construction of a private roadway which would deprive the lot owners of an 18-foot strip which they now use as part of their yard frontage.
