No Miracle Cure for Poverty, Welfare Group Told

Poverty will continue to be a national problem, 60 county welfare directors attending a University of Wisconsin institute were told Wednesday.

"There is no immediate miracle cure," Dr. A. P. Miles, Wisconsin professor of social work, said. "Our Western civilization still has to eliminate poverty and dependency.

"Until a happy, idyllic time comes, we will continue to administer social insurance and public assistance in the usual human trial-and-error method.

"It is doubtful if our social technology of 1950 is sufficiently advanced to permit public assistance workers to perform miracles."

Dr. Miles added that vocational work and preventive and corrective medical care appear to be the greatest hope of rehabilitation.

The university reported that 80 social studies teachers and business educators had registered for an institute on economic and social understanding. Sessions will continue until July 7.

Scholarships Offered for Alcohol Studies
