# 'Lily of Quito' Is Holy Year's 7th New Saint

VATICAN CITY — (AP)— Maria Anna de Paredes, who offered her life to save her plague-stricken people in 17th century Ecuador, was elevated to sainthood Sunday.

Her canonization — the seventh and last of the 1950 holy year — was witnessed by 40,000 persons, including 450 Ecuadorian pilgrims.

Pope Pius XII presided at the solemn ceremony in St. Peter's basilica.

The solemnity of the canonization was interrupted midway in the ceremony by a fire on a cornice of the church. Vatican firemen climbed 75 feet above the Pope's head and stamped out the blaze, which was caused by a short circuit.

Maria Anna de Paredes, the "Lily of Quito," is the second Latin American to be elevated to sainthood. She joins the Peruvian saint, "Rose of Lima."

The Pope fixed May 26, anniversary of her death, as the date on which the new saint is to be revered.

Maria, who devoted her life from childhood to prayer, fasting, and other spiritual acts, died in a plague in 1645, when she was only 26. She had prayed that her life be taken and the people of Quito spared.

Two days after her death, white lilies suddenly bloomed in the garden where her blood had been placed, giving rise to her designation, the "Lily of Quito." Her father and mother both were of noble Spanish families.
