# 12 from City, Area to Get Knapp Awards

Forty-eight recent graduates of Wisconsin and Illinois high schools have been recommended for Knapp scholarships of \$250 to \$500 a year beginning this fall, the University of Wisconsin announced Friday.

Of the 48 whose names have been sent to the university board of regents for approval, three are from Madison and another nine are from the Madison area.
