## 8 Road Jobs at \$614,486 Get Approval

Eight road improvement projects costing \$614,486 were approved by Gov. Rennebohm Friday.

Biggest job outlines concrete paving 4.095 miles of U. S. Highway 10 near Amherst Junction in Portage county. The Vinton Construction Co., Manitowoc, will do the work for \$191,010.

St. Croix county — 5.898 miles, grading and draining U. S. 12 and State 35 near Hudson, O'Keefe Construction Co., De Pere, \$179,764.

Grant—4.11 miles, base course, County Trunk C between Trunk X and U. S. 18, Turner and Son, Bos-cobel, \$120,608.

Sauk—3.214 miles, grading and draining State 138 near Rock Springs, O'Keefe Construction Co., \$59,200.

Green—4.441 miles, base course, State 69 between Monroe and Monticello, Ryan Sons, Janesville, \$47,743.

St. Croix — .273 mile, general improvement State 35 near Somerset, with the county, \$6,489.

Buffalo—Removal of utility lines for right-of-way on State 35 and 54 between Fountain City and Bluff Siding, with the Wisconsin Telephone Co., \$5,134.

## 58 New Polio Cases Reported in Week

Fifty-eight new cases of polio—largest total for one week this year—were reported this week, the state board of health said Friday.

The 1950 total rose to 185, considerably behind last year's aggregate of 407 at this time.

Milwaukee county reported 11 new cases.
