

Radio Plans Extensive Election Coverage

Extensive coverage of today's Madison, Dane county, Wisconsin, and nationwide elections has been promised by the city's radio stations, several of which will stay on the air long past regular sign-off time.

And on Wednesday morning, The State Journal will round out the picture with its 15-minute news broadcast at 7:30 over WIBA.

Here are the plans, as announced by the stations:

WIBA and WIBA-FM

Early bulletins on regular newscasts at 5:30, 5:55, and 6:25 p.m.

First NBC reports on "News of the World" at 6:30 p.m., with Morgan Beatty in charge.

NBC summaries at 7:25, 7:55, 8:25, 8:55, and 9:25 p.m.

Local interruptions of programs when the news warrants.

Thorough county and city coverage beginning with 10 p.m. news. Al Gilbert and Fred Weiss handle state and area returns at Radio Park; Duane Tucker and Jack Newman report on county results from the courthouse; DeAlton Neher covers city referenda from the city hall and visits party headquarters to pick up candidates' reactions.

At 10:30 p.m., half-hour NBC roundup, with Beatty, H. V. Kaltenborn, Ned Brooks, Richard

Harkness, and Ray Henle presenting national aspects of gubernatorial and congressional contests.

WIBA stays on the air after normal signoff (midnight) until results are definite.

WISC and WISC-FM

Devote almost whole evening to election coverage, cancelling all network programs except "America's Town Meeting" at 8, Frank Edwards' news at 10:15, and John B. Kennedy's news at 10:30.

First bulletins expected on 6 p.m. news.

Local reports at 7:25, 7:55, 8:30, 9:25, 9:55, 10, and 11 p.m., with returns included in the Ed Silvera show, which begins at 10:35.

Stations stay on air after midnight.

WKOW

CBS reports in Allan Jackson's news at 5 p. m. and Edward R. Murrow's period at 6:45 p. m. Other early reports at 6 p. m.

Network summaries at 8 and 8:30 p. m.

CBS coast-to-coast roundup from 9 to 10 p. m.
