Open sale will begin Monday of all remaining reserved seats for the Madison Theater Guild's three performances of "The Corn Is Green" next Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights, according to a box office announcement.

 The box office, located in the Madison Community Center, 16 E. Doty st., will be open daily next week from 10 a. m. until 4 p. m. to accommodate purchasers of single admissions to the play. Seats have been reserved by mail all this past week for season patrons of the Guild's adult play series.
 Thursday and Friday nights the play is to be offered at West high school; Saturday night it will be moved to East high's auditorium.
 Under direction of Robert Merri-man, "The Corn Is Green" will be the second play of the 1950-51 adult bill—dedicated in its entirety as the "Lucille Dunn Memorial season," in honor of one of the organization's charter members who died last year.
