One of the most difficult things a non-professional acting group can do is revive a play which has been seen in its community, with a first-rate cast, within the memory of much of the audience.

The Madison Theater Guild did just that Thursday night at West high school with Emlyn Williams' "The Corn Is Green." And the result was successful.

Marjorie Schaffer, in the role which Ethel Barrymore played here in 1942 and 1943, and Patricia McKune, as the cockney girl originally played by Thelma Schnee, gave sterling performances.

"The Corn Is Green" is the story of an English spinster who decides to spend her inheritance—and the rest of her life—teaching in rural Wales. She meets apparently insuperable obstacles, and almost gives up.

Then she discovers a brilliant mind behind the blackened face of a young miner and adopts womanly guile long enough to win the village squire to her side. A wanton, selfish girl almost deprives her of the privilege of seeing her protegee go to Oxford via scholarship.
