King Crosby's physician says he probably will leave St. John's hospital, Santa Monica, Calif., early next week. The singer underwent an operation a few days ago. He taped several shows beforehand, including next Wednesday's with Tallulah Bankhead as guest.

One of the season's outstanding radio dramas is expected Mar. 4, when "Theater Guild on the Air" (NBC-WIBA) will have John Gielgud in "Hamlet," with Dorothy McGuire as Ophelia and Pamela Brown as the queen.

## Board Confirms Five Valuations, Cuts One

The city board of review confirmed five protested assessments Friday and granted one reduction.

Increases were confirmed on properties of Dorothy Weber, 814 E. Johnson st., \$4,075 to \$7,200; Steve Lippner, 2617 E. Washington ave., \$27,025 to \$45,520; Dr. Arvin B. Weinstein, 1901 Monroe st., \$5,375 (on vacant lot) to \$26,600, with building; John H. Knobbeck, 818 Burbank place, \$300 to \$1,500; and Mrs. Martha Mazzara, 511 Blackhawk ave., \$5,500 to \$9,300.

Mrs. Harry Moseley, 616 N. Carroll st., was allowed a reduction from \$18,300 to \$17,100. The property was assessed at \$9,725 in 1949.

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
