Stop Induction of Cheese Men, State Group Asks

If military induction takes away skilled help from Wisconsin's 1,300 cheese factories, ability to handle increased milk production will be threatened, the Wisconsin Cheese Makers' assn. said Thursday.

In a letter to Lewis B. Hershey, director of national selective service, the associate stated:

"Wisconsin produces about 14 per cent of the nation's milk and 50 per cent of the nation's cheese. Milk cannot be economically utilized if present skilled and trained manpower is depleted at this time. There isn't a single cheese factory with surplus help.

"This is a plea for economic stabilization of the state's dairy industry, and not a brief for any individual.

"Only solution appears to be an immediate directive postponing induction of Wisconsin cheesemakers—provided milk receipts at the factory and amount of help justifies such action."

George L. Mooney, Plymouth, executive secretary of the association, said that the letter was "prompted by a feeling of responsibility to the government."

He added that the "seriousness of the situation cannot be over-emphasized, and facts are undisputed."

4 Draft-Defying Sons Get Father's Blessing

BRUNO, Mich.—(UP)—An angry father of four draft-defying sons said Thursday that "I'll never let my boys fight in a war just so we can make millionaires out of gangsters."

William Doty, 62, a Pine county farmer, told the United Press that he and his four sons defy the military draft and denounce congressmen as "traitors to God and humanity" for passing the selective service law.

The sons—Joel, 24, Orin, 23, Sidney, 21, and Paul, 22—have been indicted by a federal grand jury for violation of the selective service act in refusing to register. "The act is unconstitutional, and a shameful attempt to destroy the moral dignity and rights of man," the elder Doty said.

Free on \$1,000 bond each, the youths will appear in federal court at Duluth, Minn., Mar. 2 for a hearing.

One of the boys, Joel, failed to register during World War II but "got by without anybody knowing it."
