88 FROM G-E IN SERVICE

Eighty-eight employes of the General Electric company's Bridgeport works have entered the armed forces since the outbreak of the Korean war, it was disclosed yesterday.

Slightly more than half of them have volunteered, while the remainder have been inducted through selective service or called to active duty from reserve or National Guard status.
