The series, employing top Broadway and Hollywood stars, will present plays taken from the best in the theater, fiction, poetry and literature, as well as original scripts by such well-known writers as William Faulkner, Ernest Hemingway, Irvin S. Cobb, John Steinbeck, Eugene O'Neill and Tennessee Williams.
