There is an old rule kicking around some place to the effect that when a piece of wood has been attacked by rot and decay it must be replaced. Now this doesn't necessarily mean that the entire piece of wood has to go just the damaged portion. So what we need is a wood patch.

All the damaged wood has to be removed first. Cut this out with nice straight edges so you won't have trouble getting a patch to fit. A hack or miter saw is a pretty good tool to use for the cutting. And be sure to cut back far enough into solid wood to be certain that there are no traces of rot. That's the trouble with rot—leave just a trace of it and like a fire it will spread all over.

Now for the patch. For small jobs you can use a plastic filler such as plastic wood but for big babbles you need a wood patch cut to the exact size. Smooth down the edges with sandpaper so that you get a really nice fit. If the patch is not going to be exposed to the weather and if appearance counts it can be fixed in place with wood glue. For outside work it's best to coat the hole to be filled and the bottom and side of the patch with white lead. Force the patch into place and secure with nails or screws. Wipe off excess white lead and then paint the patch. The white lead will produce watertight joints which are important unless you want the patch to rot.
